'ACCOMPANIMENT' IS NOT 'TEACHING'

The presence of Jesus in authentic accompaniment

An event that comes easily to mind when people think of accompaniment within the enterprise of catechesis is the encounter between Jesus and the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. This is an example of the disclosure of truth undertaken by Jesus himself in order to open the understanding of the disciples to the reality that they had lived through without grasping its meaning. Until Jesus came up with the disciples they had been accompanying each other, though without being able to see through the darkness of Calvary that still enveloped them. The reaction of the disciples to witnessing Jesus breaking the bread at Emmaus is well known. It brings Jesus' accompaniment of them to a successful and joyful conclusion.

But does that mean that the catechist who accompanies others, either as individuals or in groups, takes the part of Jesus in whatever is happening there? Put like that, any aspirant catechist, or anyone engaged in ongoing formation, is given food for thought. By itself



a title or a vocation is not going to be enough to justify such a bold claim. When the Emmaus disciples returned to Jerusalem ready to pour out their good news, they found that the disciples who had stayed in Jerusalem had already heard from the women and Saint Peter that Jesus had appeared to them. Only after the Jerusalem disciples had made known their experience did the Emmaus disciples share what had happened to them. Moments later Jesus appeared to all the disciples gathered in the room and opened the minds of them all to understand the scriptures.

These two apparently separate events are really a single episode. They are united by the presence of Jesus, even though not all the disciples who had heard from the women and Saint Peter had had a personal encounter with the one who had risen from the dead. This then is a matter of mutual accompaniment in which the experience of each group enriches the experience of the other. The outcome is the foundation of a community of faith on a central experience that no one present on the road to Emmaus or in Jerusalem can claim to have initiated or been the origin of. The teacher of them all is Jesus who appeared to different people in different ways so that the proclamation of each individual or group could benefit all the others.

It would be anachronistic to call everything that happened on Easter Day as recounted by Luke 'ongoing formation'; however, that event shows that apostles, women, and disciples of other sorts, all learned together that Jesus had risen from the dead and what his rising meant. Nor did things end there, as we know. The mystery continues to present itself to many different people who all have their contribution to make to the continuing formation of the faith and understanding of the communities to which they belong. Accompaniment is a gift given to many and to be accepted by all. We have been taught to call no one on earth our teacher for our teacher is Christ. One aspect of authentic accompaniment is to live this directive, to be ready to follow other believers as much as to lead, and first of all to follow Jesus, who is the only one who can show everyone the way to journey's end.
