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
## FATHERS IN FAITH

#### An occasional series on the lives and legacy of priests of the Archdiocese of Birmingham

#### CANON FRANCIS DRINKWATER (3<sup>rd</sup> August 1886 - 11<sup>th</sup> December 1982)

Francis Harold Drinkwater was born in Wednesbury, and like many Birmingham priests of his generation, was educated at St Wilfrid's College, Cotton (1898-1903), and went on to Oscott College (1903-1910). During his time at Oscott, Francis came under the influence of the rector, Henry Parkinson, first president of the Catholic Social Guild, founded in 1909. From Parkinson, he imbibed a lifelong interest in social issues. He was one of three brothers who went to Oscott; John was also at Cotton and Oscott, and went on to be a devoted and much-loved parish priest of St. Michael's Wolverhampton. Oscar decided not to pursue a priestly vocation, and left Oscott, married, and joined the Royal Flying Corps in 1917. A year later, he was killed in action.

In 1915, Francis Drinkwater offered himself for chaplaincy service, and served on the Western Front until 1919. His experience as an army chaplain brought him into contact with many young Catholic soldiers, who helped to shaped his own future ministry. His exposure in the trenches to the failings of the young soldiers' experience of religious instruction through learning by rote led him to conclude that "religion should be presented to children as something to be done, something to be lived". Drinkwater reflected deeply on the quality and character of Catholic education and catechesis, and put his thoughts and ideas



into practice. His remarkable work was all developed while he served as parish priest of Holy Family, Small Heath, from 1921 until the end of the Second World War, despite the church being bombed in 1941. In 1945, he moved to Lower Gornal.

In 1922, Drinkwater became Diocesan Inspector of Schools in Birmingham, and two years later, secretary to the National Board of (Catholic) Religious Inspectors. Both appointments provided the opportunity to put his reforming ideas into practice. In 1929, the Archdiocese of Birmingham adopted his catechetical scheme, as outlined in the journal he founded, *The Sower*.

Drinkwater's pioneering work in religious education remained a central part of his life and, was recognised as groundbreaking. It brought him international recognition, and at the International Congress of Catechetics in Antwerp in 1956, he was hailed as the "patriarch of the catechetical movement in Europe".

Retirement from parish life in 1964, gave him greater freedom to write and speak on social matters as well as education. He published on a range of social issues. In the 1930s, it was on the financial system in Money and Social Justice (1934); in the 1950s it was on the nuclear threat in Conscience and War (1950). During the 1960s, he turned his attention to current debates in Birth Control and Natural Law (1965), and in the 1970s, he discussed scripture in The Fact of the Resurrection (1978).

Francis Drinkwater died on 11<sup>th</sup> December 1982, and his lifetime of remarkable service was summed up in the 1983 edition of *The Sower*: "He was a man of truth and courage, of deep prayer and humanity. He was a man of God".

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#### **Discovery Days - Summer 2023**

The chapel in this picturesque village is the upper storey of a medieval malt barn with access via a staircase. The Bishop family lived in the original house and, like other recusant families, maintained a secret Mass centre throughout times of persecution. I am grateful to Professor Judith Champ who accompanied us and who gave detailed historical information on all aspects of our visit. We concluded our day with an enjoyable lunch in a local pub. I look forward to further Discovery Days and seeing more of our rich Catholic heritage in the Archdiocese.

#### The Retreat for Priests - July 2023

I am sorry to say that in the eleven years since my priestly ordination, I have never attended the annual retreat for priests at Oscott. I had fallen for perennial comments that it is not a 'proper retreat': that the bar is open each evening, that talking is permitted, that the food is questionable. The bar was open each evening, there was talking and the food was excellent. Abbot Paul Gunter offered a series of conferences that spoke to the questions raised by the world, the response that the liturgy offers to those questions, and spoke profoundly to the experience of the Archdiocese of Birmingham, which Abbot Paul knows intimately and fondly. These provided the foundation and atmosphere for a wonderful week of prayer and authentic priestly fraternity offering refreshment for mind, body and soul. It was a proper retreat.

#### The Conference for Priests - June 2023

At the end of June, the priests of the Archdiocese were invited to attend The Conference for Priests at Newman University entitled The Gift of the Priestly Vocation: Forming Ourselves to Form Others. It offered an exploration of the Ratio Fundamentalis (released in 2016 by the now Dicastery for Clergy) with regard to the place of ongoing formation in the life of priests.

It was a delight to be joined by Bishop David Oakley, who offered two reflections in his witty and self-effacing style, on the Church's vision for the life and ministry of priests in a rapidly changing world. He emphasised the necessity to guard with courage the things that enable priests to grow as men and in ministry, namely: prayer, study, and fraternity. This personal formation allows us to offer a rich formation for the people we serve.

The Conference at Newman was a tangible example of the points he made: to be together as brothers, to pray for each other and our ministry in the chapel before the Blessed Sacrament, to grow through our interactions and the talks we received.
